The 2024 Blackboard Awards Teachers, pupils worse-off than peers in these islands

he annual Blackboard Awards gala has been told teachers here are paid less than their counterparts across these islands.

And to make matters worse the investment per pupil in the North also lags behind the expenditure in the Republic of Ireland, Scotland, Wales and England.

Professor Daniel Muijs spelt out the stark reality of educational budgets in an address to teachers from all sectors at the awards ceremony in Riddel Hall, Queen's University Belfast, on Friday past.

And he said the key element mitigating the impact of underfunding was the excellence of our teaching staff.

"Both as a former teacher myself and through the vital work of this university, I know the transformative power education can have on children and the profound impact a great teacher can have on a child's life," said Prof Muijs.

"Since moving here, I have been impressed by the quality of teachers and leaders in schools in Belfast and beyond," added Belgium native. the "International studies show that NI performs as well or better than England, Wales, Scotland or (Republic of) Ireland. This is actually quite surprising as funding per pupil is significantly lower than in those comparator countries, our curriculum is average, our society suffers from high levels of poverty and disadvantage, not to mention intergenerational trauma, and educational policymaking can be hard when half the time there isn't a government to make policy in the first place. So why do we do so well? All the data I have looked at shows one clear answer: It is the quality of our teachers and leaders.

Prof Muijs, Head of the School of Social Sciences, Educational and Social Work, renewed calls by Queen's for additional funding by the Executive for education. "While we do, of course, welcome the return of the Executive and having ministers to oversee the Higher Education and Education portfolios, recognise that there are still many unanswered questions and uncertainty for schools not only across Belfast but right across Northern Ireland/the North of Ireland. The biggest issue we face, of course, is funding. We haver made it clear, in no uncertain terms, that it is crucial that the Executive makes a meaningful investment in children and young people and their education now, today, to reap the long-term benefits in future. We simply cannot afford not to.



Schools vital to staffing needs, says firm's boss

H&J Martin has been synonymous with the Belfast construction trade for over 150 years.

Looking around the city, the firm has built many of our landmark buildings including Belfast City Hall and the Grand Opera House, as well as Dublin's famous Arnott's department store. Recently the company's fit-out side of the business also completed a multi-million pound contract at Harrods in London.

And H&J Martin came on board for the Blackboard Awards when we recognised our teaching heroes who are changing hundreds of young lives for the better every year and who are using their own unique skills to forge a brighter future for our young people throughout the city.

On Friday March 1 we hosted a gala dinner and awards night at Queen's University's stunning Riddel Hall as a special recognition to those who work tirelessly within our schools.

H&J Martin have 270 employees, of which 138 are tradespeople. The firm is based on the Sydenham Road in Belfast, with offices in Portadown, Blanchardstown in Dublin, Livingston in Scotland and a significant workshop in Cookstown. Kieron Millar, MD of H&J Martin, was present on the fit in perfectly with the company's ethos.

"We have continual resourcing needs to bring apprenticeships in and pivotal to that is schools and the teachers at the schools who enable those kids to eventually come through and work for us," he said.

"We work on a lot of Trust projects and have been awarded the Lot 3 Western Region of Northern Ireland Pan Government Management Framework contract – which we are currently recruiting for which is for all government buildings in the west side of Northern Ireland. Our fit-out business is primarily retail. We have worked with Harrods, Waterstones and H&M. That side of the business is more fit-out in terms of refurbishment or new builds for retail clients. We recently completed a project in Harrods in Knightsbridge on the third floor, which was a £2.5million project.

have a rather unconventional non-teaching background with a Bachelors in Home Economics and a Masters Degree in Clothing/Textile Design in Pakistan. Living in NI since 2007, I noticed a significant lack of teaching facilities available for pupils wishing to take GCSE RE (Islam) which the vast

majority of schools don't even teach. I am working in a voluntary capacity in NIMFA, providing those services for over seven years.

Part of the role is to coordinate with schools to discuss subject choices with their RE staff and the examination requirements. Pupils attend from a diverse background and from a range of schools from all over NI to attend their weekend classes. The unique composition of my cohorts over the years enables healthy and active discussion within the class, given their cultural and personal life experiences. Teaching such a diverse class is rather satisfying and rewarding and I always look forward to it.

Students receive personalised feedback and one-on-one support after each internal assessment so they know their strengths and weaknesses, enabling them to achieve very high scores with over 50% of the class consistently getting 100% marks over the years, which is really remarkable given the theoretical nature of the subject.


